EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since 2009, Grades of Green has been mentoring and equipping students with the knowledge and leadership skills they need to create meaningful environmental changes locally and globally. Despite the multitude of challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, we doubled down to create our most impactful program yet: the Climate Solutions Campaign.

Nearly 600 students were empowered to turn their environmental aspirations into a reality during our first ever year-long Campaign that spanned five of the most pressing climate topic areas. By incorporating learnings from past RISE Campaigns, hosting 100% of the program content on our website, and putting environmental justice at the forefront of program design, our students were able to make long-lasting changes in their communities for the greener.



HOW CAMPAIGNS WORK

For the Climate Solutions Campaign, and all of Grades of Green's RISE programs, we guide middle and high school student teams to make long-lasting impacts in their communities by advocating for environmental change and developing leadership skills.

THE CAMPAIGN PROCESS

Grades of Green Program Advisors are paired with student teams around the world to provide students with expert advice on how to plan and execute their projects. Teams of an average of 10 students, led by a teacher or parent, dive into our program materials which include educational resources, videos, research, worksheets, and multimedia. These materials guide students through the following steps with the goal of teaching them to understand environmental issues and create a solution to implement in their school and/or community.

RESEARCH

Students become an expert on one of five topics tied to the climate crisis waste, trees and deforestation, transportation, energy and food.

CREATE A SOLUTION

With the support of their Grades of Green Program Advisor, students develop a solution to an issue and create a plan to make positive environmental impacts. Students identify who they want to engage, what change they want to make, and how they are going to make that change.

TAKE ACTION

Students then put their plan into action and record their environmental impact and outcomes of their advocacy efforts in their community.

REPORT RESULTS

Students collect and submit information about their project, advocacy materials and impact metrics to a panel of expert judges.

EARN ECO-GRANTS

Judges select teams with the most powerful impact and inspirational outcomes to receive Eco-Grants up to \$1,000 to continue and expand their projects' reach!

CREATE IMPACT

Through their advocacy projects, students create meaningful and long-lasting change in their schools and communities.

SUPPORTING TEACHERS

Thanks to the generous support of our community, this year Grades of Green was able to offer \$500 stipends to the incredible teachers and adult team facilitators who took part in our new Team Facilitator Training program and supported their student teams through the completion of the Climate Solutions Campaign. We provided two trainings and many one-on-one meetings to ensure a superb program experience for both the students and their adult support system.

NAIROBI, KENYA

Our Grand Prize-winning team is a group of four motivated girls who organized a community-wide tree planting event where they planted tree saplings to promote indigenous foliage as a means of environmental conservation and carbon emission reduction. To build support for their tree planting, they developed a public awareness campaign and targeted their student peers through social media and group discussion forums. These students were inspired to join the Climate Solutions Campaign to help reduce temperatures in their school compounds while ensuring that the indigenous forest remained healthy to serve present and future generations.

SOUTH BAY ROTARY CLUB AWARD - \$1,000 THE STEAM EXPRESS TEAM FROM GARDENA HIGH SCHOOL GARDENA, CA

While researching the global climate impact of waste, the STEAM Express team from Gardena High School was very concerned about the environmental cost of fast fashion and textile waste. What really struck them was that 84% of donated clothes still end up going to the landfill. To do something about it, the STEAM Express team worked with local organizations like LAcarGUY and BizHaus, a co-working space where Grades of Green

has an office, to collect old clothes. These caring students decided to turn the clothes they collected into blankets to be donated to local homeless shelters. For their dedication to the environment and to people in need, the students were chosen by the South Bay Rotary Club to receive a special Eco-Grant!

MOST INSPIRATIONAL TEAM AWARD - \$500 THE REDONDO REDUCERS AT REDONDO UNION HIGH SCHOOL REDONDO BEACH, CA

The Redondo Reducers Club, led by Rylee, hosted a Plastic Pollution Solutions Panel discussion featuring panelists Samuel Liu, Deputy Chief of Staff for California State Senator Ben Allen, Anika Ballent, Education Director at Algalita Marine Research and Education Center, and Allie Bussjaeger, Director of Impact and Sustainability at human-I-T. The panel dove deep into the most pressing issues around plastic pollution, what the public can do to address the plastic pollution issues and reflected on themes from the award-winning documentary, The Story of Plastic.

GREEN INFLUENCER AWARD - \$500

THE "FOR THE GREENER GOOD" TEAM AT MIRA COSTA HIGH SCHOOL MANHATTAN BEACH. CA

The Mira Costa team partnered with local businesses to encourage planet-friendly diets through a viral Meatless Monday social media campaign. Every Monday from February through April, the team encouraged social media followers to post a picture of their meatless meals. Participants were entered into a giveaway for gift cards to local plant-based restaurants. They also partnered with the environmental nonprofit, evry.app, to help people keep track of their daily climate actions and footprint. By encouraging their community to cut back on meat consumption, they helped create positive, long-lasting environmental change.

MOST COLLABORATIVE TEAMS AWARD - \$500 ADAMS HIGH SCHOOL & FARMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL ROCHESTER HILLS & FARMINGTON, MI

Students from Adams and Farmington Hills High Schools collaborated on a project to get their schools to ban Styrofoam lunch trays and replace them with sustainable alternatives. These teams conducted research to identify viable Styrofoam alternatives, presented to their school board and met with experts from Cafeteria Culture to improve their project. This work culminated in two petitions that the teams issued and an interview with their local radio station to raise awareness and rally community support. The teams laid the foundation for their schools to make their food service programs more sustainable.

COMMUNITY CHANGEMAKER AWARD - \$500 THE KELLER GREENIES AT HELEN KELLER MIDDLE SCHOOL LONG BEACH, CA

Grades of Green's students from Helen Keller Middle School teamed up with fellow Long Beach students to advocate for Long Beach Unified School District to commit to transition to 100% renewable energy by 2030. These students went above and beyond through their advocacy by collaborating with local government leaders, Long Beach Unified School District staff, press outlets, and nonprofit organizations. In addition to hosting a petition to support their advocacy goals, they hosted a Climate Town Hall virtually that connected the public with local leaders and stakeholders, including City of Long Beach Vice Mayor

Rex Richardson, Los Angeles Unified School District Board Member Scott Schmerelson, and Sierra Club Senior Campaign Representative Mary Lunetta.

BEST ELEMENTARY IMPACT AWARD - \$500 MARY BRAGG ELEMENTARY SCHOOL **CERRITOS, CA**

The Mary Bragg Green Team is made up of 54 4th, 5th and 6th grade students who decided to tackle the topic of trees this year. The students self organized into three groups and identified a different solution for their projects. Team One increased urban tree cover by conducting a community tree planting in the City of Long Beach, while Team Two joined the Reserva Youth Land Trust letter-writing campaign to protect old-growth rainforests and Team Three created a Mary Braga Green Team website to educate others about the urban heat island effect and share the teams' impact.

ROOKIE TEAM OF THE YEAR - \$500 WESTON HIGH SCHOOL WESTON, MA

At Weston High School, the Students for Environmental Action Club (SEA) team, led by Max, created a recycling campaign to collect 46,500 plastic bags from their school and community and transformed the waste into a community bench through a partnership with the Trex Company. Max and the SEA were inspired to start this campaign when the Governor of Massachusetts banned the usage of reusable plastic bags in supermarkets at the height of the pandemic during the summer of 2020. Using the Eco-Grant award, Max hopes to gain additional funding and support to secure a full-time baler at the town's recycling center, the Weston Transfer Station, which will help ensure a long-term solution of recycling bags locally in Weston.

COMMUNITY ADVOCATES AWARD - \$500 THE ECOLOGY & WILDLIFE CLUB AT WHITNEY HIGH SCHOOL CERRITOS, CA

The dedicated Ecology and Wildlife Club at Whitney High School hosted a community tree sale to offset their school's paper usage and surpassed their goal by distributing 132 trees. The team partnered with the nonprofit, Tree-Plenish, to source the Gala apple trees and worked with their school administration to collect and distribute their trees during a drive-thru pick up. With their Eco-Grant funds, the Club is excited to help upgrade their school gardens since they have been deteriorating with the closure of their school over the past year and a half.

MOST DYNAMIC TEAM AWARD - \$250 THE KISHOKA YOUTH ORGANIZATION MOMBASA, KENYA

The students from the Kishoka Youth Organization aimed to reduce air pollution levels in Mombasa through a multi-level public education and advocacy campaign. In order to raise awareness of the harmful carbon dioxide emissions produced by cars, the students organized a "Cycle to Reduce Carbon" event. Students and community members were mobilized on bikes and headed to the coastline of Dongo Kundu where they planted mangrove trees. Additionally, the team conducted litter pick-ups, presented at seminars and educated younger students on the importance of mangroves.
